# City of Greenville's municipal election set for Oct. 4

The City of Greenville's upcoming municipal election is scheduled for Oct. 4, 2021.

A slate of city council seats for Wards 3, 4 and 5 are up for election or reelection.

Vying for the Ward 3 council seat are incumbent Vernon Greenlee (I) and Rosetta Williams (D).

Ward 3 voters will cast their ballots at Covenant Presbyterian Church, 1865 S. Main St.

Incumbent Lurann Thomas-Kingdom (D) and George-Patrick Johnson (D) are contesting for the Ward 4 council seat. Ward 4 Voters will cast ballots at the Senior

Citizens Civic Center, 142 N. Shelby St.

Running for the Ward 5 council seat are incumbent Tasha Bailey-Banks (D), Bill Brozovich (I) and Catherine Maxwell Gardner (D). Ward 5 voters will cast ballots at the Elwyn Ward Recreation Center, 1648 Mississippi 1 S.

To cast a ballot, voters must have a valid government-issued photo identification, which can include a driver's license, a state-issued ID card, a passport, a government employee ID card, a firearms license, a student ID from any Mississippi college, a military ID or a Mississippi Voter identification card.

# State leaders fund state's controversial database after two years

For years, nearly a dozen state government agencies have sent data about the state's citizens to a research center at Mississippi State University, purportedly to help policymakers make better decisions.

That database, by design, can crank out layered analyses. There are the basics, like drop-out or graduation rates by county. Then there are more complex, like that just under 15% of Mississippi high schoolers who get career-driven technical training wind up staying on that path by attending a public four-year university.

But the Statewide Longitudinal Data System's reports and statistics haven't always been what's put in the spotlight. The database's recent history is messy, marred by years of infrequent board meetings, a former director who used the phrase "alternative data" to describe his work, and bylaws that largely kept the tax-funded database's analyses from reporters and the public.

Now the database's leadership says it's a new era for the system, which is often called its acronym: SLDS.

After two years without any meaningful updates, the SLDS has a fresh line of funding and is under a new set of rules that calls for more access to datasets.

The stakes are high: The system's success, support, and credibility are crucial if Mississippi and its new workforce development office plan to follow through with promises to close workforce and labor training shortfalls. Without reliable data to help identify gaps in the workforce, it would be all the more difficult for lawmakers and newly founded Accelerate Missis-

sippi to close them.

"We were not really using it for what its intended purpose is," said the system's board chair, Patrick Sullivan. "It's an analytical tool for policymakers to make decisions, to look at what we should be doing more of to get people into higher paying jobs."

The database was at an awkward standstill for the last two years, despite over a decade in investments that includes about \$20 million in federal grants. State legislatures declined to fund the database again until last session, when it allocated \$1.4 million to the system that's housed and run from the Mississippi State University campus. That new budget began July 1.

# Greenville police investigate shooting deaths of man, woman

Two separate shootings, less than 72 hours apart, have claimed the lives of a man and a woman in Greenville this week.

Both incidents are being investigated by the Greenville Police Department.

At about noon Monday, officers with the Greenville Police Department were dispatched to St. Charles and Ireys streets in reference to a shot person, Sgt. Danny Poe,

chief investigator, said.

Once on scene, officers found a

black male, identified as 26-year-old Isaiah Davis, with gunshot wounds.

Emergency personnel was dispatched and Davis was transported to Little Rock Medical Center, where he was pronounced deceased.

Poe said there are currently no suspects in connection to the shooting.

Then at about 11 a.m. Wednesday, officers with the Greenville Police Department were called to the 400 block of Short Clay Street in reference to a shot person, Poe also informed.

Once on scene, officers

found a black female, whose name has not been released, with gunshot wounds.

"We do have a possible suspect," Poe said, noting no arrests have been made at this time.

# Mississippi Symphony Orchestra performing for area schools, public in following weeks

The sounds of the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra will be filling the halls of schools and E.E. Bass Cultural Arts Center in the next three months.

During September, the string, woodwind and brass

quintets will perform 30-minute programs call Informances at local schools.

Michael Beattie, president and executive director of the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra, said the programs are a cross between a performance and an educational engagement.

“These in-school

visits show children the fun of playing instruments and teach topics of sound production and instrument capabilities, using varied literature,” Beattie said.

There will be 24 hands-on presentations in Western Line and Greenville Public school classrooms.

The first performances were

held Sept. 13 and will continue until Oct. 18. The programs include two books, “A Child’s Introduction to the Orchestra” and “The Story Orchestra, Four Seasons in One Day,” which include musical vocabulary, musical word games, pictures of instruments and links so the teachers and children could see and hear the different instruments.

“They are engaging and interactive and are also designed to promote interest in learning to play an instrument,” Beattie said. “The full orchestra education concert is designed to engage young people in understanding the science of sound and the ways music is integral to life.”

There will also be two performances of the main orchestra for children on Tuesday, Oct. 26, at 10 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. at the Jake and Freda Stein Auditorium in the E. E. Bass Building. These performances are not open to the public.

A public performance will be held from 7-9 p.m. Nov. 5 with doors opening at 6:30 p.m. Tickets will be available at a future date. The program will feature pops and light classical music with a full or-

chestra.

The Mississippi Symphony Orchestra is the predominant performing arts ensemble in the state, fortified by a complement of musicians, a conductor, Board of Directors, and Symphony League volunteers.

The staff manages the operating budget of \$1.7 million. MSO is also supported by an endowment held at the Community Foundation for Mississippi. A vital partnership has been forged between the MSO and the state it serves. The orchestra celebrated 75 years in the 2019-20 season.

The orchestra is conducted by Crafton Beck in his 20th season.

In 2019, he concluded 22 years as Music Director and Conductor of the Lima Symphony Orchestra in Ohio. From 1996-2001, he was Music Director of the Florida Symphonic Pops Orchestra in Boca Raton.

He has also appeared as guest conductor with many American orchestras, including the Memphis Symphony, the Arkansas Symphony and the Mobile Symphony Orchestra.

Born in Arkansas, Mr. Beck

studied clarinet for many years before choosing a career in conducting. He received a Doctorate in Conducting from the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music in 1987. Previous studies were at The Ohio State University and the Aspen School.

While affiliated with the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra in the 1990’s, he arranged over 50 selections which appeared on the orchestra’s many recordings, most of which placed on the Billboard Classical/Crossover charts for best-selling albums. His symphonic work Passage, premiered by the MSO in 2014, received the 2015 Award for Musical Composition by the Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters.

The symphony program is sponsored by the Greenville Arts Council and made possible by contributions from King’s Daughters and Sons Circle Two, Steve Azar/St. Cecilia Foundation, Delta National Heritage Area, Paul Mathis Foundation and Dr. Maroun Hayek. The program is expected to reach more than 950 children.



# COVID spending prone to abuse

With the trillions of dollars that Washington has been shelling out to schools, local and state governments and private employers since the beginning of the pandemic, let's hope someone in the federal government is focused on trying to keep the recipients reasonably honest in how the funds are used.

With so much money flowing out, with such a rush to get it spent, and with government auditors and good government watchdogs panting trying to keep up with it all, it's a recipe for large amounts of fraud and waste.

A perfect example may be coming out of Jackson, where a criminal probe is reportedly under way over a million-dollar cleaning expenditure for a service that may not have been rendered, or at least not to the degree presented on the invoices.

The Clarion Ledger is reporting that L&N Enterprises, a Florence-based company that received nearly \$1.1 million to deep clean and disinfect city buildings, is at the heart of a probe into the suspected misappropriation of public funds by a former Jackson employee.

L&N Enterprises was cut six checks from the city of Jackson from July 2020 to April 2021, the newspaper reported. Particularly suspicious was the nearly \$613,000 the company received between December 2020 and February 2021. For all but about two weeks of that time, most of the city buildings were closed under an executive order by Jackson's mayor.

Also curiously for a company capable of doing a million dollars' worth of work for one client, there seems to be precious little to testify of its legitimacy. The newspaper said it found no listed website, business phone number or social media pages for L&N Enterprises. The newspaper recently went to visit the company's address as registered with the secretary of state. It found, according to the story, "just three mobile homes on a large lot. Also on the lot was a boat, what appeared to be two new off-road style vehicles, a tow-behind trailer and several bottles of what could have been disinfectant."

Maybe there will be a reasonable explanation for what looks terribly dubious. But even if it can be shown that the money was spent legally, that doesn't mean it was spent well.

COVID-19 is an airborne disease, and the risk of getting infected by touching a surface where droplets have fallen is small. As a mitigation strategy, forking out more than a million dollars for an outside company to come in and sanitize surfaces sounds grossly excessive. Doesn't the city of Jackson have any janitors on its payroll?

# Analysis: Mississippi examines help for departing inmates

Alabama law that took effect July 1 expands parole eligibility, and lawmakers are looking at programs that could help people make the transition from prison back into the free world.

House and Senate committees met Wednesday at the state Capitol to gather ideas from several people, including prison and parole officials in Alabama, a leader of a nonprofit group that helps former inmates and an executive of a software company that coordinates services for people leaving prison.

One common theme in the presentations was that people who have been incarcerated fare better in the next phase of their lives if they receive guidance in practical matters such as getting a driver's license, finding a place to live and finding a job.

"We need to make sure that we try to equip individuals with as much as we possibly can when they come back into society so they don't go back into the place they came from," Senate Corrections Committee Chairman Juan Barnett, a Democrat from Heidelberg, told The Associated Press on Friday. "It's one of those things that we really, really need to tackle."

House Corrections Committee Chairman Kevin Horan, a Republican from Grenada, said Friday that Mississippi needs to improve transitional housing for people leaving prison. He also said legislators also could consider creating reentry courts to provide supervision and guidance for departing inmates.

Jefferson Dunn, commissioner of the Alabama Department of Corrections, told Mississippi lawmakers that his state develops a "programming plan" for each inmate who enters the prison system, with a goal of preparing them to leave when they are paroled or when they reach the end of their sentences.

"Reentry begins with entry," Dunn said. "We have reworked our entry process to begin that process of reentry, whether it is three years or 30 years or longer, in the department. ... We want to begin from Day 1 to have inmates look towards reentry and view their time of incarceration as an opportunity and everything that they do to move them closer to reentry."

Louise Wasilewski is CEO of Acivilate Inc., an At-

lanta-based company whose software coordinates communication for what she calls "returning citizens" — people leaving prison. She said the company has contracts in other states, but not in Mississippi.

"We do really simple things like helping people sort out all the activities they have to do and sending them text reminders — just the same way that your dentist sends you a text reminder to make you show up," Wasilewski said. She said such reminders could be used before probation hearings, for example, with the goal of keeping a person from returning to prison.

Mississippi lawmakers also heard from Kerri Pruitt, executive director of the Dannon Project. The nonprofit group was founded in 1999 in Birmingham, Alabama, and it is named for Pruitt's brother-in-law, who was killed by a man who had been released from prison.

Pruitt said the Dannon Project is active in Alabama and South Carolina, working on "holistic reentry services," including help with health care, behavioral health services, transportation, housing and court appearances.

"We don't believe in allowing any of our participants in attending court alone, even when they have a court-appointed attorney," Pruitt said.

Cam Ward, director of the Alabama Bureau of Pardons and Paroles, said state governments need to ensure they use reentry programs that are data-driven with a record of being effective. He said groups outside government can provide valuable help.

"The notion that somehow, some way as a state government you're going to have enough resources to provide all the proper reentry and diversion programs is just not true," said Ward, a former Alabama state senator. "You're going to have to have partners."

The next Mississippi legislative session is set to begin in early January. Barnett said some lawmakers could gather in November or December to discuss whether to file bills that would propose specific types of reentry programs.

### Perry Lee Gibson Jr.



In the fall, Perry plans to attend the University of Memphis and study Criminal Justice with the goal of becoming an FBI Agent.





posed are fixed with the limits as stated in Section 27-39-301 and 27-39-305, both inclusive, Section 27-39-207 and Sections 27-39-309 and Section 27-39-317, both inclusive, of the Mississippi Code of 1972, and all amendments thereof, as stated in House Bills #46 and #52 Laws of 1954; the general county taxes being governed by Section 27-39-303, road taxes by Section 27-39-205, and school taxes by House Bill #46, Laws of 1954 and in the event the total levy for any road district shall exceed the limit fixed by Section 27-39-305; and in the event the total levy for any school district shall exceed the limit fixed by law, the county-wide levy shall have precedence over any levy for a school district.

Section 9. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the above rates or levies in mills or a decimal fraction thereof shall be applied to each dollar of assessed value as shown upon the 2020-2021 assessment rolls of Washington County, Mississippi, and in the respective districts upon which said rates or levies are respectively fixed, except as to such values as may be exempt by law, in whole or in part, from certain tax rates or levies; it being the intention and purpose of the Board of Supervisors of Washington County, State of Mississippi, to fully and in detail comply with all requirements of law relating thereto, and especially Section 27-39-317 of the Mississippi Code of 1972, and Chapter 280, Laws of 1946.

SECTION 10. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that all money received and collected by the Tax Collector and paid by her to the proper fund according to the provisions of this order shall be credited to the proper fund by the proper official; and shall be expended for the purposes authorized by law and for no other purposes.

SECTION 11. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Clerk of this Board be and she is hereby expressly directed to comply with all the requirements of law prescribed by Section 27-39-319 of the Mississippi Code of 1972 relating to the certification and publication of the ad valorem rates or levies herein made and fixed.

SECTION 12. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that:

A. There is attached an order from the Mississippi Levee Board requesting 2.90 mills ad valorem and five cents (\$0.05) per acre and levied tax on public utilities the same rate as assessed by the State of Mississippi.

B. The drainage tax as levied by the various drainage districts are also included in the proceedings of the September 7, 2021 minutes.

SECTION 13. Pursuant to Section 49-19-115 of the Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended, there is hereby levied on all timbered and un-cultivable lands in the county in order to receive the financial and supervisory cooperation of the State Forestry Commission in carrying out organized forest fire control and other provisions.....\$.05 per acre

The above budget and resulting tax levy for fiscal year 2021-2022 was considered and, on motion by Supervisor Redmond, seconded by Supervisor Brooks, all voted Aye.

## O'Bannon's McIntosh recalls high school glory days

On a Labor Day weekend, a long time Greenville Kroger employee surprises one of the store's bread vendors when she shares that she used to play point guard for the O'Bannon Lady Waves about 15 years ago.

Like many who frequent this popular grocery shopping location, they know Marci McIntosh from her 14-year career at the store and her current position as the floral department manager.

But not only did she play for the Lady Waves, McIntosh was a varsity starter as an eighth grader and a foundational piece for the building of the Lady Waves 21st Century program. "It was tough back then because I remember one season where we had only five players," she recalled. "And when one player would foul out, we still had to play against other teams shorthanded."

McIntosh always had talent when it came to handling and scoring the basketball.

"The one thing that I learned from him is that a point guard communicates not only with words but with understanding where the ball should go and where the rest of your teammates should be on the court."

There were dozens of big moments, heated rivalries and pressure packed game situations. Even though it has been 15 years since she last played for O'Bannon, McIntosh sifted through all the memories to highlight a few very special ones. "The best game that I had was when I hit a buzzer beater to beat St. Joe during my tenth-grade year," she said. "And there was no team that I wanted to beat more than Greenville High."

Mississippi coach Lane Kiffin sees a Tulane team that plays with energy, is well coached and has quality depth.

In fact, what he sees is some Southeastern Conference-style characteristics for the next team facing his 17th-ranked Rebels (2-0) Saturday night at Vaught-Hemingway Stadium.

"When you watch them, you feel like you're playing an SEC team," Kiffin said. "There's a reason they went down basically to the last minute of the game versus Oklahoma at Oklahoma."

The performance Tulane (1-1) had in that opener against the then-No. 2 Sooners is enough to make the Rebels wary despite being favored by two touchdowns. The Green Wave outscored Oklahoma 21-3 in the second half of that 40-35 defeat, which Kiffin thinks is a credit to that depth.

"I think how hard they play, and they rotate a lot of guys on their whole defense," he said. "They play really hard and I think it paid off for them later in the Oklahoma game. They fell behind early but I bet they would say they played better in the second half because they weren't worn out."

Tulane followed up that narrow miss with a 69-20 win over Morgan State while playing in Birmingham, Alabama because of Hurricane Ida's effects.

## MSU Bulldogs set to battle Memphis

**MEMPHIS, Tenn.** — The Mississippi State Bulldogs are the only Power Five team on Memphis' schedule this season, and Tigers coach Ryan Silverfield refuses to shy away from the importance of this game.

"I can't sit here and say: 'It's just like every other game.' There's a heightened sense of it," Silverfield said. "Let's be real about it."

Memphis has had mixed success in recent years against major conference teams with wins over Kansas, UCLA and Ole Miss. Beating a team from the South-

eastern Conference, well, just means more. Silverfield said it's definitely "a different perception from those on the outside looking in" than a win over Nicholls State.

That also means the stress level goes up too for Saturday's game.

"I get stressed out over Spring Practice No. 2," Silverfield said.

These teams are renewing a series dormant since 2011 and that the Bulldogs have dominated since 1993. Memphis has improved over the past decade alone with a string of bowl games, winning seasons and NFL-bound offensive threats.

Mississippi State (2-0) defeated Louisiana Tech and downed North Car-

olina State 24-10 last week. Memphis (2-0) beat Nicholls State before holding off Arkansas State 55-50 in a shootout.

Mississippi State is looking for its best start since 2018 — two years before coach Mike Leach arrived on campus. His Bulldogs face a defense that gave up a whopping 680 yards of offense last week — 582 through the air. Will Rogers leads the nation completing 36 passes a game.

"The biggest thing that jumps off is experience," Leach said of Memphis' defense. "They've all been there. They're all seniors. Some of those guys have started more games in college than our kids in high school."
